CURRICULUM DEVELOPMENTS

Maths

This term we have introduced a new **Maths intervention** on Friday mornings. This aims at developing the skills of our young mathematicians by supporting them in smaller groups with work that is specifically designed to supplement the main class and develop their knowledge base. During this time, the children who are not involved in the intervention groups have the opportunity to revise and extend their knowledge of the topics covered during the week.

This has got off to a successful start and this is set to continue both during face to face lessons in school and if there is a return to VL in the future.

For those with children partaking in the programme, the addition of individual folders for each child will begin to give you an insight into some of the content the children have covered in their sessions. Furthermore, a new class has been set up on class dojo for each of the Friday Maths intervention groups. This is to keep you updated on some of the work the children will be completing under the tutelage of our teaching assistants leading the sessions.

Science

The subject of Science is a continuous, incremental process that involves generating hypotheses, collecting evidence, testing hypotheses, and reaching evidence-based conclusions. Rather than involving one particular method, **scientific inquiry** is quite flexible.

The study of Science, especially in a school setting, exposes students to a myriad of topics, offering a balance of Physics, Chemistry, and Biology. With this in mind, having an approach as flexible as the Scientific Inquiry method would not only be beneficial in planning experiments or observations, but also in the way Science is being taught in school. Doing it this way would encourage the students' curiosity by way of allowing them to question what is being taught and running tests and experiments on what they would wonder on.

As such, this will not only give students autonomy over their learning but also allow them to have ownership of their learning through their own discoveries. Not only will they apply the theories and concepts learned in their lessons, but they will also be able to acknowledge and test their curiosities and questions that would arise from having learned these concepts and theories.

In Term 3, Primary Science will be focusing on implementing this in all Science lessons. This will start with Key Stage 2 in the first half of Term 3 2020/21, and in the latter half with Key Stage 1.



The chart showcases the Scientific Inquiry Method stages. Years 3 and 4 will be focusing on the 4 areas of Question, Research, Experiment and Analyse. This is done so that they would familiarise themselves with the method first before properly engaging with all six steps in Year 5 and 6. Our current Year 5 and 6 cohort will be working through all 6 stages of the Scientific Inquiry Method in Term 3.



English

In English this term, we have had a focus on reading. For students who had graduated from the Phonics Programme, this has meant an introduction to the VIPERS Reading Comprehension Programme. VIPERS is an acronym to aid the recall of the 6 reading domains as part of the UK's reading curriculum. They are the key areas which children need to know and understand in order to improve their comprehension of texts. **VIPERS** stands for:



A: No, I'm not interested in teaching in Japan or Korea. Because I'm loving it in Malaysia!


(Gladys): Why do you like Malaysia?

SPOTLIGHT ON ENGLISH

What has been going on in the Secondary English & Humanities Department this term? Plenty to highlight here, read on for a taste of this term's **featured department**!

Introducing EEP (Ms. Adri)

The English Enrichment Programme is a bespoke course for students who need intensive intervention in English. The course aims to take students from beginner and elementary level to pre-intermediate level at which point they will reenter the mainstream school. The students have 25 periods of English per week on top of Music, P.E., Science, Maths and Art lessons. This term they have done a lot of work on the four skills: reading, writing, listening, and speaking in their EAL lessons, while in Academic English they have focused on academic writing.

Round up of English [ESL] department activities (Ms. Evelyn)

In Term 1, we took part in Sunway National Poetry Slam 2020, organised by Sunway Education, where our students created their wonderful poems and recorded their performance for YouTube votes. Well done, all of you!

In Term 2, we have participated in an English Writing Competition, presented by Marshall Cavendish Education (MCE), with the first-time use of Artificial Intelligence, which is a writing assisting programme called SCRIBO. All the best to our students!

The World Economics Cup provides a very unique learning and competing experience with its own unique philosophies of economics education. It tests students' learning abilities in Economics


