Secondary Academic Language Initiative

At the beginning of Term 3, the EAL Team and the English and Humanities Faculty have started their newest collaborative project to enhance Secondary students' academic language skills. The project, which was aptly named Straits Talk, aims to help KS3 and KS4 students familiarise themselves with the Cambridge Command Terms, which form part of all IGCSE examination papers across the curriculum.

### What is it about?

These higher-level academic vocabulary items often hold students back from being able to answer exam questions fully. To provide support, we have started to incorporate some of these challenging expressions into our teaching in all English lessons. By all of us doing this, we help our students understand, retain, and apply these expressions more successfully.

#### How does it work?

Each month we focus on 5 Command Terms. The key here is consistency and repetition so that our students are exposed to the different uses of these command words in the different subject areas. We introduce and explain these terms at the beginning of the month in English lessons and then we raise the level of challenge by giving students different activities to perform with these terms. We also point out how these terms are used in our respective subjects and how they relate to exam papers and specific questions.



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The SIS 2021 Hari Raya celebrations were held Virtually during our Virtual Learning period this year. But that didn't stop some wonderful participation from each Year group. For Performances we had the Fashion Catwalk from EYFS. For KS 1, we saw the Year 1s Dancing to a Hari Raya Song, and Year 2 performed an improvisation of our Malaysian traditional Dikir Barat featuring the song Wau Bulan and Selamat Hari Raya. In KS2, we had the Year 3 singing to a traditional Raya song and Year 4 created a tutorial craft video on how to make the Raya Packet for Duit Raya. The Amazing Year 5s have showcased a variety of Raya related Pantuns (Poems) in Bahasa and English. In class, the students also had many Raya related Art and Craft activities to showcase their creativity.

Our SIS Secondary students (Year 7 to Year 10) showcased their Raya decoration activities before the start of Virtual learning. The Year 7s also managed to perform a Raya song. The Year 9 students are also incredibly creative, as they have rearranged the lyrics of the original song "Girls Like You" by Maroon 5. The Year 9 students changed the lyrics of the song and they changed the title to "Friends Like You". The lyrics were about what they enjoy and like about Hari Raya and also relate to how Covid has affected the Raya celebrations to accommodate the new normal. The song also celebrates how much they enjoy school and meeting friends physically, and how much they miss these things.

The Secondary Music Department has also showcased an amazing instrumental performance/ video on the song "Seloka Hari Raya".

### MR. DAVE SECONDARY SCIENCE TEACHER

Despite the strict SOP's in place, all secondary student's had a great interactive STEAM week. The week started with all of the students looking at how Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Mathematics linked into their other subjects, from famous Chinese Engineering in Mandarin, to how the Egyptians built the pyramids in History.

In Science, students researched modern technology and how it links to science and presented findings to their peers. We also had fun with some experiments in Science, including making metal "explode".

In the middle of the week, we had the main event, in the bridge building competition. All of secondary from Year 7 to Year 10 (sorry Year 11, exam build up had to be a priority!) studied bridges, including examples of famous bridges and how they are designed to withstand so much weight. Then students worked in small teams from within their own year group bubble, to design and then build a bridge which could hold as much weight as possible.

All of the students made bridges were all tested to destruction by Mr Kam and myself. Ian, Alex, Wing Yee & Divya from 7E, managed to beat all other groups, showing themselves to be potential future Engineers, by building a bridge which could hold 10kg, while only using a newspaper, wooden splints and some PVA glue!

A small group of our most enthusiastic Science students in Year 9 photographed the bridge building competition and worked independently to make an amazing presentation, which all year groups enjoyed in assembly on Friday afternoon.

English Enrichment Programme Ms Adri Students of the EEP

In September 2020 we launched the EEP with the aim of taking students from beginner and elementary levels to pre-intermediate level by covering the four skills (reading, writing, listening, and speaking) as well as vocabulary and grammar. I am happy to say that all of our students have achieved this aim, while some even surpassed it. Congratulations to all graduating EEP students!

Besides the general English component, the students have attended Academic Vocabulary and Skills lessons, which have taught them the necessary specialised vocabulary to keep up with Science and Humanities. The EEP students have had 25 lessons of English per week, including General English and Academic sessions. They have also had dedicated library time with weekly and termly projects to provide time for immersive reading; as well as Maths, Science, Art, Music and PE lessons.

Now the EEP has come to an end and our cohort of students are going back to mainstream classes with their tutor groups. Although this will be a big change with many challenges, we trust that the skills and knowledge that these students have acquired during the past three terms will help them be able to fully participate in all of their subjects. 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Here are some easy and delicious recipes to make with the kids over the summer! to make it even sweeter!

### Frozen Yogurt Bites

For an icy treat, these are so easy and healthy. Use fun shaped molds to make them extra special.

- 150g whole milk vanilla Greek yogurt
- 1/3 cup fresh raspberries (or other frozen fruits)

1. Place yogurt and fruit in a bowl and mash with a fork (If you want chunks of raspberries don't overly mash.)

2. Using a small spoon or spatula, place the mixture into silicone molds or ice tray.

3. Tap once or twice to remove any air bubbles.

4. Place the mold on a small baking sheet or directly into your freezer and freeze for 4-6 hours or until bites are solid.

5. Pops bites from molds and enjoy!

### <u>Chocolate Brownie dip</u>

This may not be so healthy, but it is delicious! Grab some fruit slices or cookies and get

- 1 package (8 ounces) cream cheese, softened
- 1/4 cup butter, softened
- 2 cups confectioners' sugar
- 1/3 cup baking cocoa
- 1/4 cup milk
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

In a large bowl, beat the cream cheese and butter until smooth. Beat in confectioners' sugar, cocoa, milk, brown sugar and vanilla until smooth.



### <u>Gâteau au Yaourt</u>

This is an old French recipe that is so easy to follow and fool proof for success! You use the yogurt pot to measure out all the other ingredients!

- 1 pot of yogurt
- 2 pots of sugar
- 3 pots of all-purpose flour
- 1 pot of vegetable oil
- 3 eggs
- 1 Tablespoon baking powder

Simply mix all ingredients together well, pour into a cake tin and bake at 180°C for about 30 minutes or until a toothpick inserted comes out clean.

<u>Variations:</u> You can substitute 1 pot of flour for cocoa or desiccated coconut or add lemon zest, chocolate chips... Have fun with it! You can also reduce the sugar and oil to 1/2 pots each.

These can also be made into cupcakes too! Just reduce the cook time.
