

### What have we been learning this week



This week in IEYC, children engaged in indoor and outdoor activities to enhance coordination and teamwork, while also learning about bears and their habitats. In literacy, they sequenced the "Humpty Dumpty" rhyme and developed fine motor skills with a fun puzzle. For math, the focus was on exploring shapes and natural objects like leaves, along with a treasure hunt to collect items by size and shape. In phonics, children worked on the sounds "k" and "u," using picture sound cards and practicing letter tracing.



This week in Literacy, we dived into 'All Are Welcome', a heartwarming story that celebrates diversity and inclusivity. Children embraced new vocabulary, recognized initial sounds, and made meaningful marks through their learning. In Mathematics, our focus was on measurement, with students comparing sizes, weights, and volumes through engaging, hands-on activities. Our IEYC theme, "Move, Sit, and Stretch," introduced students to six Tai Chi moves, six yoga poses, six Pilates exercises, and mindful walking. It's been a week full of fun, movement, and discovery!



This week we had our entry point for Who am I? It was a fun opportunity for students see how we have changed. In math we have been learning about equal to, greater than and less than. In English we have been learning and practicing our sentence writing and the use of capital letters, full stops and finger spaces.

#### Year 2

What a fantastic week of learning we've had! In math, we kicked things off by ordering objects and numbers, building on last week's lessons on comparing numbers. We're super excited to start counting in 2s, 5s, and 10s next! Over in English, we continued our adventure with Sophie's Snail, discovering new vocabulary and practicing how to answer questions in full sentences. Finally in IPC, we jumped into the world of food chains with a fun online game and puzzle, in addition to creating our own food chains in different habitats. Next up, we'll be designing and building bee hotels in our Design Technology unit.

#### Year 3

We are Scientists in Year 3! As part of our new unit 'Material World' we conducted experiments about the properties of different materials.

In Maths, we engaged in a revision session to consolidate all of our learning over the last few weeks. We will have our first end of unit assessment this week and it is a wonderful opportunity to show off our learning/ progress and highlight what our next steps are.

In English, we independently wrote a set of instructions. We are now experts at using time connectives and imperative verbs! We also learnt how to reflect on our writing using a success criteria. Year 4

We came to the end of our 'Place value' unit in maths this week, which culminated with a revision session before next week's assessment. The children worked on rounding to 10, 100 and 1000 to round the unit off in style.

In English, the children focused on notetaking skills and sentence writing. We also reviewed some areas of grammar including parts of speech.

In IPC, Year 4 worked on types of living things including classification of animals.

### What have we been learning this week



Although this was a short week, it was packed with engaging activities! In IPC, we explored different root vegetables and identified two types of root systems: taproot and fibrous root. Students created detailed sketches and playdough models to showcase their understanding. They were fascinated by the hands-on experience of observing these roots up close. Their home learning project involves growing spring onion roots in a glass jar to observe their development over the weeks.

In Maths, we consolidated our learning on Place Value and completed our first end-of-unit assessment. It was wonderful to see the progress made and highlight our next steps. In English, we continued our exploration of figurative language, focusing on key vocabulary to describe characters and settings in Thumbelina.



Year 6 continue their science investigation for IPC this week. They are learning the science of baking by doing investigations on evaporation, cooling, heating and filtering. In English, they are learning the persuasive writing technique using simile, metaphors and the 5 senses. For reading, we have started chapter 7 and 8 of The Wild Before book, together with comprehension questions. Students also highlighted tricky words while reading. For math, we continue with Four Operations topic .This week we learn about prime numbers, square numbers and cube numbers.

Subject lesson update EYFS: Guessing items from sounds in listening activities (e.g., animals and household items). Year 1: Feelings and Action Songs - Students learn about emotions, reactions, and actions through music.


Year 2: Call and Response: Students learn to follow and respond to the beat being played. They create their own dance moves and dance to the music, following the rhythm.
Year 3: Rhythm and pulse (Performing own rhythm)
Year 4: Create own rhythm and applied to percussion instrument
Year 5: Rhythmic dictation
Year 6: No lesson



This week in EY, students explored the flight of an object and practiced basic catching skills. In KS1, students focused on shooting a ball with their hands in basketball and with their foot in football, emphasizing correct technique. This week for KS2 in the Fitness unit, students focused on their body balances based on yoga poses and for the Badminton unit, students focused on returning a shot in a games situation.
