Children use it for casual conversations, emotional support, and homework help, though the responses aren't always reliable. They also engage in creative roleplay, using chatbots for storytelling, acting out scenarios, and simulating conversations with fictional characters—an entertaining activity that can sometimes blur the line between reality and fiction

Children may develop emotional attachments to Al chatbots, treating them as real friends or therapists. This can lead to dependency on Al for emotional support rather than seeking real human connections. Moreover, Al chatbots store and collect data that may be shared with third parties. If a platform experiences a data breach, sensitive information could be leaked or exploited.

> Children may believe AI-generated responses are always factual, even when they contain harmful stereotypes or unverified advice on sensitive topics like mental health. Some users exploit AI chatbots to create harmful or manipulative roleplay scenarios, which can normalize unsafe behavior. Additionally, online predators may use AI-generated interactions to groom minors, making it harder for children to recognize unsafe situations

Help your child recognize signs of manipulation, bias, or unsafe interactions in Al chatbots, and encourage them to talk to a trusted adult if they ever feel uncomfortable. Additionally, stay informed about Al platform updates and potential risks, enable chat history deletion and content filtering, and use parental controls to manage app usage and data privacy.





Talk to your child about how AI is not human—it doesn't have emotions or real understanding. Encourage them to think critically about its responses and remind them that not everything AI says is true. If they would like to use AI chatbots, explore together and set rules on sharing personal details or engaging in overly personal chats. It is best to promote screen-free time and real-life interactions to prevent over-reliance on AI for companionship.

This week in our EAL classrooms, students engaged in exciting and meaningful learning experiences tailored to their development levels.

 Year 1 explored their five senses, expanding their vocabulary and writing simple sentences related to sensory experiences. They also completed their weekly spelling test to reinforce their learning. •• ?

Year 2 focused on personal hygiene, specifically the importance of handwashing. They
wrote about why washing hands is essential and created a step-by-step guide on how
to do it properly.

• Years 3 & 4 dived into the topic of healthy habits. Through group discussions, they developed their communication and teamwork skills while also enhancing their ability to answer reading comprehension questions effectively.

A key highlight of our classroom is our "Word of the Day" initiative. Being in ISP Changemaker makes us to think a lot about the environment, the people and the world. We have learned that the world needs to be cared for and taken care of. Our group has successfully planned, budgeted and finalized the Project Rainwater Harvesting System. We got our grant approved and waiting for the project to be completed. Once completed by the school, we will create a mini garden behind the dance studio balcony and monitor the water irrigation which was harvested. We are excited to see it come alive!

We are learning about all the changemakers in the world that really impacted our lives, be it young or old. Changemakers teach us that we can be the change to make a difference.

What have we been learning this week



This week, our little learners will embark on exciting IEYC activities, from wind chasing and cloud gazing to exploring hot and cold sensations and catching the sun! In Math, they will practice giving and counting three objects, matching simple shapes, and combining blocks. Literacy sessions will bring The Wind Blew to life as children enjoy longer stories, expand their vocabulary, retell key events, and form longer sentences while also tracing or writing letters. Phonics learning will be filled with songs, games, and hands-on activities, helping children explore new letter sounds, digraphs, and word-building through fun small-group tasks.



This week, our little learners dove into the enchanting story Three Little Fish and the Big Bad Shark. They created their own storybooks through picture drawing and mark-making while practicing writing simple phrases. In Maths, the children explored different representations of 9 and 10, comparing amounts and developing their conceptual subitising skills. Through hands-on activities, they deepened their understanding of building numbers 9-10. For IEYC, the "Fishy Fish" unit brought creativity and teamwork to life! The children made paper plate turtles, collaborated in team games, and designed a "My Shell Home" booklet. They also created a dazzling Rainbow Fish with glittering scales and crafted an "Amazing Sea Creatures" poster. It was a fin-tastic week of learning and discovery!



This week in IPC students have been carrying out various experiments to understand the needs of plants.. As a class we made hypothesis about what seeds need to germinate and students are observing seed growth in different conditions.

In Math, students have been exploring mass and volume. The focus this week has been to consolidate key vocabulary such as volume and capacity.

In English, Students have been focusing on writing couplets and short rhyming poem.



This week, the children focused on punctuation in English, learning to use apostrophes for possession and contraction before recapping key punctuation marks in their writing.

. In Math, they explored Length & Height, comparing and ordering measurements and applying all four operations to problem-solving tasks.

For IPC, they learned about the origins of resources, practiced map-drawing with compass directions, and began exploring the importance of rules.

The week ended with a pirate-themed reading comprehension lesson based on The Pirate Kids: The Great Treasure Hunt.



Maths: Ms Haifaa, Ms Annette and Ms Alrissa are super proud of our efforts in fractions. This week we have learnt about fractions and scales, fractions on a number line and fractions as bar models.

English: we have continued learning about persuasive writing. This week, we learnt about rhetorical questions, repetition and persuasive language. We began planning our persuasive piece of writing, 'Why you must visit Malaysia!'.

IPC: this week, we have been exploring overtourism and how to be responsible tourists! We made posters encouraging sustainable actions tourists can make. We also examined CO2 emissions and what types of transport have the biggest impact.



Maths: We continued our work on fractions by exploring improper fractions and mixed numbers. The children learnt how to covert them, find equivalents and place them on a number line.

English: A number of lessons have had a grammar focus connected to our unit on historical fiction. The children have reviewed conjunctions, prepositions and improving description through adjectives and adverbs. This will help them to improve their historical settings.

IPC: Our lessons have explored volcanoes in greater depth through creating fact files about a famous volcano, mapping volcanoes and understanding volcano tourism.

What have we been learning this week



This week has been an exciting one in Year 5, full of hands-on learning and discovery! In Maths, we have continued mastering decimals and have now dived into percentages, exploring how they relate to fractions and decimals. The students have also been working hard on their Times Tables Rock Stars (TTRS) competition, showing great determination and effort to improve their speed and accuracy.

In IPC, our Science lessons have been all about sound! We have been investigating how sound travels through different mediums and conducting experiments to explore this concept further. One of the highlights was using a tuning fork to make rice jump on a drum—this was a real 'lightbulb moment' as students could see sound vibrations in action!

In English, we have been learning about the structure of persuasive writing and the key devices that make arguments more convincing. We have been using the acronym AFOREST (Alliteration, Facts, Opinions, Rhetorical questions, Repetition, Emotive language, Statistics, and The rule of three) to strengthen our persuasive writing skills. The students have enjoyed crafting compelling arguments and applying these techniques to their writing. It has been a fantastic week of learning, and we are so proud of the students' enthusiasm and engagement. We look forward to another exciting week ahead!



Y6 continued their IPC unit researching about The Persian War, ancient Greek buildings such as The Parthenon, Theatre of Dionysus and Alexander The Great. It was mind blowing!

For Math, Y6 covered division and multiplication by 10,100 and 1000 as well as dividing and multiplying decimals by integers.

In English, we continued to learn the features of a historical recount, explicit and implicit meanings in texts.

For reading , we continued with Percy Jackson and the Lightning Thief, chapter 5,6 and 7 as well as spelling words together with Viper questions.














We are looking into renaming our Wings so that they more accurately reflect the amazing learning that takes place in each area of our school.
