Wellbeing Updates

As the digital world continues to evolve, so do the opportunities and risks our children encounter online. While these platforms can be engaging, they also expose children to misinformation, potential manipulation, and content that may impact their mental well-being. Staying informed and proactive is essential to keeping them safe and helping them navigate the digital space responsibly.

Online Platforms and Al Chatbots

Children are increasingly using online platforms that allow them to chat, game, and interact with Al-generated content. While these can be fun and social, they also come with risks.

- Al Chatbots (e.g., Character.Al, Replika) These platforms allow users to engage in Al-generated roleplay, sometimes leading to emotional dependency or exposure to inappropriate conversations.
- Discord A chat platform where users can join groups (servers) that may contain explicit content or unmoderated discussions. Strangers can contact children directly if privacy settings aren't enabled.
- Roblox A popular gaming platform where users can create and play games.
 Despite safety measures, inappropriate games and interactions with strangers remain concerns.
- Omegle (now shut down, but similar platforms exist) Previously known for random video chats with strangers, it exposes children to explicit content and potential exploitation.
- Snapchat Disappearing messages make it difficult for parents to monitor interactions, and features like "My AI" (an integrated chatbot) can expose children to unpredictable conversations.
- TikTok and YouTube Shorts While popular for short videos, their algorithms can expose children to inappropriate content, including dangerous challenges or harmful narratives.
- Kik & Telegram Messaging apps that allow anonymous or encrypted chats, often used for private conversations that can be difficult to monitor.



What You Can Do

1. Monitor and Set Boundaries

- Check Platform Usage: Regularly review the apps, websites, and games your child engages with.
- Set Screen Time Limits: Encourage a balance between online and offline activities.
- Keep Communication Open: Foster a safe space where your child feels comfortable discussing their online experiences.

2. Use Parental Controls and Privacy Settings

- Enable content filters and privacy settings on Discord, Roblox, TikTok, and other platforms to limit exposure to harmful content.
- Restrict in-app purchases and monitor friend requests to ensure your child isn't interacting with strangers.

3. Teach Digital Literacy and Critical Thinking

- Encourage children to question online content and verify information before believing or sharing it.
- Discuss AI limitations, so they understand how chatbots generate responses and why they shouldn't rely on them emotionally.

4. Stay Informed and Engaged

- Familiarize yourself with the latest online trends and potential risks
- If needed, seek additional support from school counselors or online safety experts.

By staying informed, setting clear boundaries, and fostering open conversations, we can help our children build healthy digital habits and navigate the online world safely. Together, we can create a supportive environment where they can enjoy the benefits of technology while staying protected from its risks.



Future Pathways Updates

This week, Ms Nadia and Ms Nur from ISP visited our school to provide personalized guidance sessions to our Year 9-11 students on their future pathways. They discussed course options, pre-university opportunities, and how to make informed decisions about their next steps. Students were also introduced to the various tools available on Unifrog, a comprehensive platform designed to help them explore career pathways, university options, and skill-building resources—all in one place. It has been another exciting and productive week in our EAL classroom! Our students have been expanding their vocabulary, improving their writing skills, and engaging in meaningful discussions. Here's a look at what each year group has been working on:

- Year 1 Explored different modes of transport (land, water, and air) and classified them accordingly. They also completed their weekly spelling test, showing great improvement in word recognition!
- Year 2 Focused on the theme of kindness by learning kind words and phrases to use in daily conversations. They also practiced their reading comprehension skills, using inference strategies to find answers within texts.

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

















ISP Film Makers - Behind the Scenes!

Our filmmaking journey started with scripting, where our teacher introduced the dialogues and storyline. After rehearsals, we moved on to filming in different locations like the cafeteria, corridors, and staff room. Seeing my schoolmates' step into their roles as actors and crew members was truly inspiring, and the energy on set was incredible!

What have we been learning this week



This week in IEYC, children will explore different types of weather by acting as little meteorologists, predicting the weather, and engaging in sensory play to understand rain. Outdoor experiments will help them discover how wind moves objects. In Math, they will practice early subtraction by counting, taking out small amounts, and sharing items. Literacy activities will focus on Mr. Golden Sun, with singing, drawing, and recognizing 'S' words, while also tracing and writing the initial sound of 'Sun'. In Phonics, children will learn new letter sounds and digraphs through songs, games, and hands-on activities, strengthening their skills with letter matching, word-building, and sound identification.



We explored The Three Little Fish and the Big Bad Shark!

Students used new vocabulary in discussions and role-play, drew story maps, and recorded the story through pictures and mark-making. They sequenced the story and wrote simple phrases using letter-sound correspondences and tricky words.

In Maths, we compared heights using tallest, shortest, taller, and shorter with real objects. We explored bigger structures using non-standard units, learned about day & night, sequenced events, and marked special days on a calendar. A checkpoint assessed understanding.

For IEYC, we kicked off the Ocean Treasures unit with a beach party! Students explored ocean treasures, created sand patterns, built treasure chests, and weaved fishing net crafts.

It was a productive week!



Year I

English: We began with reviewing rhyming and learning about rhyming in poems.

Math: Students learn about length and height. They learnt how to measure using non-standard units and cm. Their end of block assessment was on Friday.

IPC: Students started their green fingers unit. Students took part in their entry point, where they got to experience planting their own seeds. As part of the learning students are learning key vocabulary to do with plants and nature.



Year 2

English: We began the term with a new story, The Pirates Next Door. Learning focused on reading comprehension skills, including prediction, vocabulary, and inferences.

Math: The 5 times table (multiplication & division) was our focus at the start of the week before we moved on to problem-solving questions and consolidation activities. We then completed the end-of-unit assessment on Friday.

IPC: We started our Treasure Island unit with our Entry Point and Knowledge Harvest before moving on to our geographical lessons. During these lessons, we learned about geographical features and vocabulary, as well as the continents and oceans on Earth.



Vear 3

Welcome back to Term 2.2! It has been wonderful to see Year 3 students participating in Book Week.

In English, we began our new unit on persuasive writing - we will be convincing YOU to visit different countries. We have read a variety of persuasive texts and created a story map.

In Maths, we are learning about fractions! We now know what a unit and non-unit fraction are and understand numerators and denominators.

In IPC, we enjoyed sharing where we have travelled to for our Entry Point and creating a Frayer's Chart for our Knowledge Harvest.



Vear L

We started our new unit on fractions in maths this week by looking at counting beyond 1 in fractions and using mixed numbers.

Our work on historical fiction began by exploring examples and identifying the features.

In IPC, Year 4 started their new unit 'Active Planet', by exploring natural disasters.

We had a great trip to Kita Bina.

What have we been learning this week



What an impactful start to the term! It has been wonderful to see Year 5 students enthusiastically participating in Book Week—from dressing up as book characters to finding creative, unusual places to enjoy a book! In English, we kicked off our new unit on persuasive writing. Students explored the different techniques advertisers use to persuade us, analysed the structure of persuasive texts, and applied their learning by crafting compelling arguments on various topics.

In Maths, we've been diving into decimals, with students embracing the "good struggle"—deepening their understanding of the concepts while confidently tackling extra challenges. For IPC, we launched our new unit, Look and Hear, with an exciting Entry Point! Students explored four interactive stations, experimenting with objects that produce sound and light. Through hands-on activities and discussions, they responded to guiding questions designed to spark curiosity before we delve deeper into the science behind hearing and vision. It's been a fantastic first week back, and we can't wait for all the learning ahead!



A great start to Term 2.2 by all over Year 6. We started our new Math Unit, Decimals, where all students are excelled in this difficult Year 6 topic! In English we have started to look at writing historical recounts, using our new learning from IPC. In IPC we have delved into the ancient civilizations and asked ourselves the question, 'What was life like as a Spartan/Athenian?', there was some mixed responses from the class! We also started our new class book, 'Percy Jackson and The Lightning Thief', students have enjoyed the start to this new book and are looking forward to see what happens next.





Together as a community, we can save the earth and the environment.





















We are looking into renaming our Wings so that they more accurately reflect the amazing learning that takes place in each area of our school.
