

Multilingualism Matters

Dear Parents & Families,

This week's focus is on how to support your child with homework in English while encouraging them to use their home language as a tool for thinking and understanding. Using the home language at home isn't just okay – it's powerful and helpful!

Tip of the Week: Supporting English Homework with Home Language Thinking
Why it matters:

Children learn best when they fully understand what they're being asked to do. Thinking and talking about tasks in the home language first helps them build confidence and clarity before working in English.

- 📝 Three Simple Ways to Help at Home
- 1. Translate Instructions Together

Before your child begins their homework:

- Read the task instructions in English.
- Talk about what the question means in your home language.
- Ask: "What do you need to do first?" or "Can we say this in our language?"

Even if you aren't sure of every word, discussing the meaning helps your child understand the goal of the task.

- 2. Discuss Ideas in Your Home Language
- Help your child plan their answer by:
 - Talking about the topic in your home language.
 - Asking questions like:
 - "What do you already know about this?"
 - "How would you explain this to a friend?"
 - Let them explain or brainstorm freely without worrying about grammar or spelling.



3. Build a Bridge to English

Once they've planned or talked about their answer:

- Help them find some key words in English.
- Use a dictionary or translation tool together if needed.
- Encourage them to write the first sentence, then talk it through together.

Remember:

Thinking in the home language is not "cheating" – it's a smart strategy. Your child is building strong understanding and learning how to express themselves in both languages.

I started playing chess because I was curious about the game and wanted to challenge myself in a new way. I had seen others play and was fascinated by how such a quiet game could involve so much thinking and strategy. I wanted to be part of that, and I knew that learning chess would also help me become more focused and better at solving problems.

Being part of Chess Masters has taught me a lot more than just how to move pieces. I've learned how to plan ahead, think critically, and stay calm even when things don't go my way during a match. One of my proudest moments was when I managed to win a game in just a few moves. It showed me how important it is to stay alert and make every move count.

Sometimes the matches can be really tough, but I remind myself to breathe, focus, and take my time. Each game teaches me something new, whether I win or lose and I try to learn from every experience.

To keep improving, I like to practise online, especially on Chess.com, where I can play with people from around the world. I also enjoy watching chess matches and tutorials to pick up strategies. And when I get the chance, I play friendly matches with my friends, just to stay sharp and try out new techniques.

Chess has helped me grow in many ways, not just as a player, but also as a thinker.
