Many students also recognised the high expectations set for them this year and spoke positively about the supportive relationships that help them succeed.

Students asked for more consistent and timely feedback, lessons that are more engaging, and fewer distractions—especially in Years 7 to 9. We're also reflecting on how we can strengthen student voice in learning and ensure that all students experience the right level of challenge. These insights are already shaping how we grow and improve as a school community.


Global Citizen

PRACTICE DEEP BREATHING

It involves taking slow, controlled breaths to activate the body's relaxation response. Guided videos on box breathing & bubble breathing are available on Youtube.

MAKE A 'CALM-DOWN' KIT

Set up a calm corner/box in your space with tools and activities that help your child feel better when they're stressed/anxious. Try things like music, fidget toys, colouring books or a glitter jar.

USE HEALTHY SELF-TALK

Speak to yourself kindly and realistically during tough moments. It turns unhelpful thoughts into supportive ones & builds confidence. Example: "I'm going to fail" → "I've prepared well & I'll try my best."



Topic: Celebrating Code-Switching and Translanguaging

Dear Parents and Guardians,

This week, we're focusing on an important aspect of your child's language development: code-switching and translanguaging. These may sound like complex terms, but they reflect something very natural and valuable in multilingual households – the ability to move between languages.

What Is Code-Switching?

Code-switching happens when a speaker alternates between two or more languages in a single conversation. For example, a child might say, "Can you help me with my kerja rumah (homework)?" This is not confusion – it's a sign of a flexible and developing multilingual brain!

Translanguaging goes a step further. It's when students use their full linguistic repertoire to understand, learn, and express themselves – drawing on all their languages, not just one. For example, a student might read information in Mandarin, discuss it in Malay, and write about it in English. This process strengthens understanding and confidence.

Why Is This a Strength?

Many parents worry when they hear their child mix languages. But research shows:

- It supports deeper learning and clearer thinking
- It builds confidence and identity
- It reflects strong cognitive control children know when and how to switch based on context

At school, we encourage translanguaging as a way to support learning and connection. Students might:

- Plan in one language and present in another
- Use bilingual resources for research
- Create projects that include home languages alongside English

🏠 How You Can Support at Home

- Celebrate language mixing as a strength, not a mistake
- Let your child use their strongest language to understand ideas, then express them in English
- Share your own experiences of switching languages
- Use bilingual books, media, and storytelling at home

By embracing all of your child's languages, you are helping them become more confident learners and communicators.






