Sometimes your child just needs to feel heard. *Try: "That sounds really tough. Want to talk more about it?"*





Even if you don't agree or understand, their emotions are real to them. Say: "I can see that really upset you. It's okay to feel that way." Show them it's okay to feel, by how <u>you</u> cope. Talking it out, taking breaks or journalling teaches kids that emotions are manageable.

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CREATE A SAFE SPACE AT HOME

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If conflict/tension happens, try to repair, reconnect and remind your child that your love is steady, even when you disagree.

Say: "I'm sorry things got tense earlier. I love you, and I'm here when you're ready to talk." It's not about avoiding tough moments, it's about showing your child that when things go wrong, you're still on their team.

Dear Families,

At Straits International school, we celebrate and support the development of all languages spoken by our students. One simple yet powerful way to nurture language skills at home is through reading books in two languages. Whether you use dual-language books (books with two languages side by side) or read the same story in two separate versions, this practice helps strengthen vocabulary, comprehension, and cultural connection.

Here are some tips and ideas to make the most of reading in two languages:

U Why Read in Two Languages?

- Boost Understanding: Reading a familiar story in your home language first can help your child better understand the English version later.
- Build Vocabulary: Seeing or hearing the same words in two languages helps your child connect new vocabulary to words they already know.
- Celebrate Identity: Sharing stories in your family's language helps children feel proud of who they are and where they come from.
- Strengthen Family Bonds: Reading in your home language can involve grandparents and other family members in your child's learning journey.

💡 Tips for Using Dual-Language Books

- Take Turns Reading: One page in English, one in your home language switch readers to make it interactive.
- Talk About the Story: Pause to ask questions in your preferred language. For example: "What do you think will happen next?"
- Match Vocabulary: Point out key words in both languages this builds connections between the two.
- Use Expression: Read with feeling! This helps make meaning clear, even when the language is new.
- Let the Child Lead: Follow their interest. If they prefer reading more in one language, that's okay too.



E Where to Find Dual-Language Books

- Use free online platforms like <u>Unite for Literacy</u> or <u>Global Storybooks</u>.
- Local libraries or online bookstores often stock dual-language titles.

🏠 Don't Have Dual-Language Books? Try This!

- 1. Find the Story in Two Versions: Read one version in your home language, and then the English version (or vice versa).
- 2. Retell the Story Together: After reading in one language, encourage your child to retell it in the other language.
- 3. Make Your Own Dual-Language Book: Fold a few sheets of paper, write a sentence in one language on each page, and let your child help with the translation and pictures.






